Sister Rosetta Tharpe was born on March 20, 1915 in Cotton Plant, Arkansas.

Ms .Sister Rosetta Tharpe was an American singer, songwriter, guitarist of gospel, jazz, blues, rock-and-roll, and a recording artist, too! Ms.Sister was the first great recording star of gospel music and among the first gospel musicians to appeal to rhythm-and-blues and rock-and-roll audiences, later being referred to as "the original soul sister" and "the Godmother of rock and roll" She also influenced a lot of other people, too!
